

2024 POPULATION:

Baraga County: 8,383

Upper Peninsula: 305,030

Michigan: 10,047,636

As of 2024, Baraga County's population is estimated at 8,383, marking the beginning of a projected decade of steady growth. Compared to 8,315 in 2023, this increase reflects early signs of a broader upward trend expected to continue through 2034.

This growth is fueled by several key factors. The county is benefiting from expanded economic opportunities, particularly in tourism and outdoor recreation, that are drawing new residents. The rise of remote work has also made it possible for more people to relocate in search of a quieter and more affordable lifestyle. At the same time, investments in community infrastructure and the development of affordable housing are making Baraga County increasingly attractive to families, retirees, and professionals alike.



In 2024, Baraga County's unemployment rate stood at 7.20%, remaining significantly higher than Michigan's state average of 3.80% and the national average of 3.60%. Despite continued recovery from pandemic-related disruptions, the county faces persistent economic challenges that contribute to its elevated unemployment levels.

Baraga County's economy relies heavily on seasonal industries such as tourism and natural resources, which often result in employment fluctuations throughout the year. A limited variety of job opportunities, combined with an aging population, also contributes to the region's workforce instability as younger residents relocate in search of broader prospects. Although the unemployment rate has improved from the peak in 2021, when it reached 12.30%, the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic are still being felt—particularly in the tourism and hospitality sectors—hindering full employment recovery. The current rate reflects both structural economic issues and the need for further diversification and investment in the local job market.





2024 EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT:

Bachelor's Degree: 11%

High School Diploma: 39%

Graduate Degree and Higher: 5%

In 2024, Baraga County's educational attainment continues to show a diverse mix among its residents. A significant portion, 39%, holds a high school diploma, while 11% have earned a bachelor's degree. Additionally, 5% of residents have obtained a graduate degree or higher. This educational profile underscores the ongoing need to expand educational opportunities and support workforce development initiatives within the county.




Top 8 Industries by Employment in Baraga County in 2024

In 2024, several industries stood out in terms of employment in Baraga County, reflecting significant economic activities and shifts within the region. Following is an analysis of the top eight industries by employment and insights into why these trends are occurring in Baraga County.















Top 8 Industries by Employment in Baraga County in 2024





Government employment remains the largest sector in Baraga County, with 1,595 jobs in 2024. This marks a 2.4% increase from 2023, adding approximately 38 new positions. Continued growth in this sector likely reflects expanded roles in public education, law enforcement, administration, and tribal government services.





Manufacturing employed 524 people in Baraga County in 2024, reflecting a decrease of about 5.6% from 2023. The sector shed approximately 31 jobs, potentially due to shifts in demand, seasonal slowdowns, or restructuring in wood products, paper production, or automotive-related industries. Despite the decline, manufacturing remains a core component of the county's economic base.





Retail Trade accounted for 186 jobs in Baraga County in 2024, reflecting a 14% increase from 2023. The sector added approximately 23 jobs, suggesting a rebound in local consumer activity and possible growth among small businesses, general merchandise stores, and fuel or convenience retailers. This uptick may also be tied to seasonal tourism or expanded retail services in the area.

Accommodation & Food Services



The Accommodation and Food Services sector employed 165 people in Baraga County in 2024, marking a 13.8% increase from 2023 with the addition of roughly 20 jobs. This growth highlights the county's continued appeal as a destination for tourism and outdoor recreation, supporting restaurants, lodging, and seasonal hospitality businesses.

Top 8 Industries by Employment in Baraga County in 2024

Health Care & Social Assistance



Health Care and Social Assistance employed 111 people in Baraga County in 2024, reflecting an 8.8% increase from 2023 with the addition of about 9 jobs. This growth underscores the sector's continued importance in delivering essential medical, behavioral health, and social support services to residents across the county.

Construction



Construction provided 106 jobs in Baraga County in 2024, reflecting a decrease of about 9.4% from 2023. The sector lost approximately 11 jobs, potentially due to a slowdown in new residential or commercial development, seasonal project delays, or the completion of major infrastructure work. Despite the decline, construction remains a vital industry for the local economy.

Other Services (except Public Administration)



Other Services employed 91 people in Baraga County in 2024, representing a 7% increase from 2023 with the addition of about 6 jobs. This sector—covering personal care, maintenance, repair services, and nonprofits—appears to be rebounding, potentially driven by increased local demand and community-based service expansion.

Finance & Insurance



Finance and Insurance employed 85 people in Baraga County in 2024, showing a slight decrease of about 2.3% from 2023, with the loss of approximately 2 jobs. While the decline is modest, it may reflect shifting consumer habits, consolidation of services, or adjustments in regional demand for banking, investment, and insurance offerings.

Industries by Employment Conclusion for 2024

In 2024, Baraga County's job market demonstrated a mixed but generally stable outlook. Government continued as the top employer, maintaining steady growth, while manufacturing experienced a modest decline after recent expansion years. Finance and retail trade showed resilience with slight fluctuations, and tourism-related jobs in accommodation and food services saw notable growth, highlighting the county's ongoing appeal as a destination. Minor declines in construction and health care were offset by gains in other services, reflecting a balanced and adaptable local economy poised for continued stability.





















Top 8 Industries by Gross Regional Product in Baraga County in 2024

In 2023, several industries in Baraga County emerged as leaders in Gross Regional Product (GRP), reflecting significant economic activities and shifts within the region. An analysis of the top eight industries by GRP reveals trends shaping the local economy, driven by factors such as population growth, rising consumer demand, and strategic investments. These trends not only enhance economic output but also create employment opportunities, contributing to the overall development and vitality of Baraga County.



Gross Regional Product
















The manufacturing sector remains a significant component of Baraga County's economy, contributing \$76.3 million in Gross Regional Product (GRP) in 2024. Total demand for manufactured goods reached \$100.1 million, with \$96.4 million imported to meet local needs. The sector generated \$152.3 million in total sales, with \$148.7 million exported, reinforcing its position as a key exporting industry. Major contributors include wood products, which utilize the region's abundant timber resources; metal fabrication, which supports industrial and construction supply chains; food processing, adding value to local agriculture; and machinery manufacturing, providing specialized equipment for various sectors.

The Wholesale Trade sector contributes \$42.4 million to Baraga County's economy. Total demand for wholesale goods is \$33.8 million, with \$39.0 million met through imports. Total sales in this sector amount to \$54.5 million, while exports total \$49.3 million, underscoring the sector's strong role in supplying goods beyond county borders.





The utilities sector contributes \$17.2 million to Baraga County's economy through Gross Regional Product (GRP). In 2024, local demand for utilities totaled \$12.1 million, with \$11.7 million of that met through imports. Despite modest local demand, the sector generated \$24.6 million in total sales, with the majority, \$24.2 million, exported to other regions. This makes the utilities sector a strong net exporter, playing an important role in serving energy and utility needs beyond county boundaries.



Gross Regional Product







The Retail Trade sector contributes \$16.1 million to Baraga County's economy in 2024. The total demand for retail goods stands at \$41.5 million, with a significant \$33.9 million met through imports, highlighting the sector's heavy reliance on goods from outside the county. Despite this, retail sales total \$24.9 million, with \$17.3 million coming from exports. This underscores the sector's important role in supporting both local consumption and providing goods to customers beyond the county limits.

Finance & Insurance



In 2024, Baraga County's Finance and Insurance sector generates a Gross Regional Product (GRP) of \$15.0 million. Local demand for these services amounts to \$47.8 million, with a large share, \$38.2 million, satisfied through imports. Despite this dependency, the sector records total sales of \$23.9 million, including \$14.3 million in exports. This reflects the sector's growing footprint in providing financial and insurance services both within and beyond the county borders.

Information



The Information sector contributes \$11.6 million in Gross Regional Product (GRP) to Baraga County's economy in 2024. Total demand for information services amounts to \$39.1 million, with \$30.9 million met through imports, demonstrating a strong reliance on external sources. Despite this, the sector generated \$19.8 million in total sales, with \$11.7 million exported beyond the county. This highlights the sector's role as both a consumer of imported information services and a provider of valuable outputs to markets outside the region.

Real Estate, Rental & Leasing




In 2024, the Real Estate and Rental and Leasing sector contributes \$11.4 million to Baraga County's Gross Regional Product (GRP). Total demand for services in this sector reaches \$22.3 million, with \$8.2 million met through imports. The sector generated \$24.2 million in total sales, including \$9.9 million in exported sales. This demonstrates the sector's balanced role in satisfying local demand while also actively participating in the broader regional economy through service exports.





Gross Regional Product



Housing

In 2024, Baraga County still faces housing challenges, with an estimated 40% vacancy rate, though most of those are seasonal homes, not available for year-round use. The actual housing vacancy rate for residents is likely under 15%, but the aging housing stock (much of it built before 1970) highlights the need for new, modern housing.

Efforts to improve housing stability include the Keweenaw Bay Indian Community securing funding to build energy-efficient homes for 20 families. Statewide, the Michigan State Housing Development Authority launched a Tribal Nations Housing Development Program to support tribal-led housing. Locally, the L'Anse Area Community Development Corporation continues working to accelerate housing development and attract investment.


What it is:



Unemployment Rate Trend






What it is:



Gross Regional Product:


What it is:


Regional Exports:


Annual Trade:




